4.26 Branxton East (b/w)

4.27 West St Cuthberts (from colour slide)

Caption: Cropmarks reveal a rectilinear, single-ditched enclosure with an entrance in the middle of the SE-facing side. The site is located on the S bank of the river Tweed. *Copyright Tim Gates, 29 July 1994.*

4.28 Marl Bog (b/w)

Caption: Cropmarks reveal a rectilinear enclosure at Marl Bog, Carham, lying to the north of a wood. Within the enclosure, towards the north-east corner, a dark-toned, sub-rectangular mark may represent a Grubenhäuser. Other possible Grubenhäuser are visible in an adjacent field to the north-west and close to the eastern edge of the wood. *Copyright Tim Gates, 22 July 1996.*

4.29 Fawdon Dean (from colour slide)

Caption: Parchmarks reveal two overlapping settlement enclosures, one of which is oval in shape and the other sub-rectangular. Both have entrances on

the SE-facing side (nearest to the camera), and the larger, sub-rectangular, enclosure also has at least one annexe attached. Both sites have been levelled by narrow ridge and furrow ploughing here seen as straight, parallel lines aligned with the slope of the hill. 4.30 New Bewick (b/w)

Caption: A complex of cropmarks at New Bewick includes a pit alignment, ditches and enclosures as well as a network of naturally occurring ice-wedge casts. 4.32 Norham (b/w)
