Throwing Fire: Projectile Technology through History by Alfred W Crosby. From rocks and arrows to the V2 and the rocket, man has been driven to dominate the world around him by throwing missiles. This lighthearted and interesting book begins in the Pliocene when man became his own worst enemy and ends with the 'longest throw' that put man in space. 206p, 16 b/w figs (Cambridge UP 2002) Hb £22.50 now £9.95

Cannibalism and Human Sacrifice by Garry Hogg. An unupdated reprint of a 1958 work, which assembles the available evidence for cannibalism and human sacrifice through history and on a global scale. It claims to make no moral judgements, but seems to me to be somewhat overcredulous of the accounts of western colonialists. 192p (Nonsuch rep 2007) Pb was £14.99 now £4.95

English Battlefields by Michael Rayner. An encyclopedia of 500 battlefields, describing the landscape and the actions fought on it as well as the background to the campaigns. 414p b/w illus col pls (Tempus 2004, pb 2007) Pb was £18.99 now £6.95

Stronghold Britain : Four Thousand Years of British Fortification by Geoffrey Williams. From prehistoric times to the present day, Williams traces the development of 5,000 strongholds across Britain. Includes Hadrian and Antonine Walls, Forts of the Dark Ages, motte and bailey castles of the Normans, castle-building in the middle ages, early modern coastal forts, 19th century and Second World War defences. 264p, 60 col and 50 b/w illus (Sutton 2000, Pb 2003) Pb was £14.99 now £6.95

The papers in this volume bring molluscan studies into mainstream zooarchaeological and archaeological debate, resulting in a monograph with a truly international flavour. The First Steps of Animal Domestication: New Archaeological Approaches edited by J. D. Vigne, J. Peters and D. Helmer. Given the central role of domestication in zooarchaeological research, it is no surprise that one of the major sessions at the ICAZ meeting in Durham, 2002 was devoted to this issue. Underwater Archaeology: History and Methodology edited by Etienne Bernand. Looks at the origins, issues, approaches and problems in diving to reclaim lost artefacts and treasures. Following introductory chapters on background and methodology, the authors examine the landscape, ecology, and archaeology of the North Wirral mosslands, the Sefton mosslands, the Central and Eastern mosslands, and the southern mosses. 288p *illus, maps* (Lancaster Archaeology 1994) Pb was £25.00 now £5.00

Wetlands of Greater Manchester by D. Hall, C.E. Wells and E. Huckerby. This study offers original research on Chat Moss, Carrington Cross, Red Moss, Ashton Moss and Kearsley Moss, as well as a description of smaller and former wetlands in the area. Wetlands of North Lancashire by Robert Middleton, Colin Wells and Elizabeth Huckerby. Prehistoric Stone Circles by Aubrey Burl. This little book has become a classic. Celtic Scotland by Ian Armit. Green Park (Reading Business Park) Phase 2 Excavations 1995: Neolithic and Bronze Age Sites by Adam Brossler and Robert Early. The Neolithic features included an unusual segmented ring ditch, and a number of pits and postholes. A field system, composed of rectangular boundary ditches, was laid out in the area prior to the establishment of a late Bronze Age settlement. The evidence for the late Bronze Age settlement included five roundhouses, and a number of post-built structures. 180p *b/w illus* (Oxford Archaeology 2003) Pb was £14.99 now £5.00

Lines in the Landscape: Cursus monuments in the Upper Thames Valley. Excavations at the Drayton and Lechlade cursuses by Alistair Barclay, George Lambrick, John Moore and Mark Robinson. Earthen Long Barrows: The Earliest Monuments in the British Isles by David Field. In this book David Field explores the origin, construction, location and function of long barrows, drawing in particular on examples from Wessex. Inscribed Across the Landscape: The Cursus Enigma by Roy Loveday. Roy Loveday has written extensively on cursus monuments and in *Inscribed Across the Landscape* attempts to summarise what we know about them, their antecedents, their history and use and their legacy. Atlantic Connections and Adaptations: Economies, environments and subsistence in lands bordering the North Atlantic edited by Rupert A Housley and Geraint Coles. Explores the diversity of human environments and cultural adaptations present from Scotland and Norway in the East to Iceland in the West from the end of the glacial period to Viking age settlement. 288p b/w illus (*Oxbow Books* 2004) Pb was £70.00 now £10.00

In this book the authors combine their complementary interests into a reappraisal of this exciting, remote and unresolved period of Egypt's unification and the activities of the early kings of the First Dynasty. 64p, 46 b/w pls (*Shire* 25, 1997) Pb was £6.99 now £3.50

Egyptian Woodworking and Furniture by Geoffrey Killen. This book gives a comprehensive description of Egyptian woodworking from the earliest times to the Late Period. The four seasons of excavation at Tell Kosak Shamali yielded around 33,000 flaked stone artefacts from the Chalcolithic period. The tools are described and documented within their chronological context, and their functional and morphological properties discussed. 318p b/w illus (Oxbow Books 2004) Hb was £40.00 now £15.00

Human Palaeoecology in the Levantine Corridor edited by Naama Goren-Inbar and John D. Speth. This book looks at the complex interplay between the Levant's dynamic tectonic and environmental history and the changing lives of the humans who inhabited the region over the course of the Pleistocene. 220p (Oxbow Books 2004) Pb was £40.00 now £10.00

The Architecture of Petra by Judith MacKenzie. This is an enormous and impressive book not only full of facts, but also solving mysteries. Shadows in the Desert: Ancient Persia at War by Kaveh Farrokhi.
